## FROM:

#### ACADEMICS

The school year is divided into two semesters with each semester consisting of two nine-week grading periods plus an exam. Students receive grades at the end of each nine-week period. Semester grades are computed by combining the grades for both nine-weeks with the grade earned on the semester exam. Each nine-week grade counts for 40% of the

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semester grade, and the exam counts for 20% of the semester grade. To earn semester credit, students must have passing grades in at least 2 of the 3 criteria in determining the semester grade (quarter, quarter, exam). Grades and point averages will be computed based upon the courses a student is enrolled in when credit is awarded.

TO:

#### ACADEMICS

The school year is divided into two semesters with each semester consisting of two nine-week intervals of instruction. Grades are a report on student learning. The student will provide evidence of learning that will be recorded and reported by the teacher. Grades and point averages will be computed based upon the courses a student is enrolled in when credit is awarded.

Semester exams are administered at the end of each semester and count for 20% of the semester grade.

### PARCC ASSESSMENT/END-OF-COURSE EXAMS - CLASS OF 2018 AND BEYOND

Ohio is a member of the Partnership for Assessment for College and Career Readiness (PARCC). PARCC is creating a challenging assessment system to track student progress through the elementary and high school years and to ensure that students will graduate high school with 21st century knowledge and skills. The PARCC assessment system will be computer-based and aligned to the New Learning Standards for English Language Arts and Mathematics. See the link (http://www.parcconline.org/) for more details. Ohio has developed assessments for science and social studies for an online administration to complement the PARCC assessments. Students in the Class of 2018 and beyond will be taking end of course exams in English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. Students will begin taking Ohio Department of Education sanctioned end of course exams in 7 areas: Algebra I, Geometry, American History, English 1, 2, Physical Science, and American Government. Students studying Advanced Placement (AP), or taking dual enrollment courses in physical science, American

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history or American government may take assessments aligned to those courses in lieu of end-of-course exams to avoid double testing. A student who earned high school credit in any of the above courses before July 1, 2014, automatically will receive a score of three points per course exam toward the total points needed for graduation. With few exceptions, students must accumulate a minimum of 18 points from scores on their end-of-course exams to become eligible for a diploma. Students must also meet one of the following three:

- 1. Earn a cumulative passing score on seven end-of-course exams. The scores will be set by the State Board of Education.
- 2. Earn a "remediation-free" score on a nationally recognized college admission exam such as ACT or SAT. The State of Ohio will pay for all 11th-grade students in the Class of 2018 and beyond to take the exam free of charge.
- 3. Earn a State Board of Education-approved, industry-recognized credential or a state-issued license for practice in a career and achieve a score that demonstrates workforce readiness and employability on a job skills assessment.

# Page 12 – Amend Tardiness Paragraph

#### From:

#### TARDINESS:

Each student will be permitted five (5) excused tardies each semester. Beginning with the sixth (6th) excused tardy, students will forfeit the right to make up work missed and be subject to disciplinary action. <u>Unexcused Tardiness</u> will result in disciplinary action and forfeiture of any work missed beginning with the first incidence.

#### To:

### TARDINESS:

Each student is expected to report to school on-time every day prepared to demonstrate learning. Tardiness will be subject to disciplinary action as defined in the Student Code of Conduct. Examples of unexcused tardiness include: car problems, over sleeping, unexcused personal reasons, and any tardiness to class without a valid excuse (as determined by the attendance office) and a pass.

# Page 12 – Amend wording in Planned Absence Section

## PLANNED ABSENCE:

- 1. Planned absences are not to be requested during those days established for semester or final examinations.
- 3. All work and/or tests are expected to be made up in the prescribed period of time. Failure to do so will result in zero (O) credit to be computed in the pupil's current grading period average.

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#### To:

#### PLANNED ABSENCE:

- 1. Planned absences are not to be requested during those days established for any building level assessments. (eg. PARCC/AIR/ASPIRE/PSAT/AP/OGT)
- All work and/or tests are expected to be made up in the prescribed period of time.
  Failure to do so may result in zero (O) credit to be computed in the pupil's current grading period average.

Students must have <u>all emergency medical</u> information on file prior to attending any field trip or school functions (ie. Dances, Clubs, Extracurricular).
